Vincent, a biologist, Régis Dutheil, a theoretical physicist, and Paul Chauchard, a neurophysiologist, propose their own unique and highly interesting theories with respect to their own scientific fields of expertise; and Lord Bishop Jean Vernette, delegate of the French Episcopate and advisor to the Vatican, puts forth the views of the Catholic Church. The result is the first cross-disciplinary scientific research into the theoretical understanding of the NDE.

Drawing on her years of experience researching NDEs, Ms. Elsaesser-Valarino poses provocative questions to each of the experts she interviews, drawing out the essentials of their research, their findings and the fascinating conclusions many of them have reached. The author takes care to ensure that their often complicated responses are discussed in detail, in terms any educated, non-specialist reader can understand.

On the Other Side of Life is an unbiased and thoughtful exchange of ideas and knowledge on the NDE. Evelyn Elsaesser-Valarino infuses this book with disarming intellectual honesty so that the reader is not unintentionally prejudiced by the controversies surrounding the NDE phenomenon. Foreword by Kenneth Ring

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Evelyn Elsaesser-Valarino's book, On the Other Side of Life: exploring the phenomenon of the near-death experience, is to my knowledge both unique and a uniquely valuable contribution to the rapidly expanding literature dealing with near-death experiences (NDEs). In the last twenty years, for example, there have been more than two score books, published in various languages, which present the essential facts about these fascinating encounters with death and are replete with many examples and case histories of NDEs, and quite a few volumes that explore the phenomenon from a variety of points of view, ranging from the narrowly and reductively scientific to the dogmatically theological and even the unabashedly spiritual, depending on the particular predilections of their authors.

Entirely lacking among this literature until the appearance of Evelyn Elsaesser-Valarino's book, however, has been a thoughtful and penetrating theoretical and philosophical examination of the NDE and its implications by persons who have achieved eminence in various fields of science – biology, neurophysiology, physics – as well as philosophy and religious thought. Here, in On the Other Side of Life, Elsaesser-Valarino has provided all those with a serious interest in the NDE with the opportunity to encounter and ponder the thinking of a very distinguished and diverse group of scholars and researchers as they themselves reflect on this phenomenon from the perspective of their own professional specialities. (I am honoured to be included among them, by the way, but I do not mean to assign to myself the adjectives I have used to describe my coparticipants!) The result is a extremely stimulating cross-disciplinary approach to the theoretical understanding of the NDE, which affords a level of intellectual illumination to this experiences unmatched by any

previous work on the subject. In consequence, you now hold in your hands a book that for some years to come will surely be an indispensable reference for anyone who wishes to acquaint him- or herself with the most searching analysis of the nature and meaning of the NDE itself.

Although many of the concepts presented in this book about the nature of NDEs, brain functioning, and consciousness may be at times a bit abstruse, *On the Other Side of Life* is on the whole very accessible to the general reader because of the *form* in which this information is presented. Rather than each contributor writing a chapter on this speciality, for example, what Evelyn Elsaesser-Valarino has done, and done superbly, is to have conducted interviews with each of her participants. The dialogues that result, then, have the sparkling immediacy of conversations between a thoughtful inquirer who knows where she wants to steer the discussion and the interviewee who is only too happy to oblige her lead and to engage her fully (and the reader eavesdrops) as he brings his own training and insight to bear on the phenomenon of the NDE.

In assembling this group of researchers and commentators on the NDE, Evelyn Elsaesser-Valarino has performed a very great service to the field of near-death studies, and her book will certainly provide many professionals who read it with a further impetus not only to take seriously but also to study and explore the NDE itself. In consequence, the field of near-death studies will certainly be strengthened by its continuing to draw the attention of investigators and scholars in philosophy, science, medicine, psychology, and religious studies, as well as other fields that have something to contribute to our understanding of just what it is that is seen through this window of death that modern medical resuscitation technology has disclosed to us all.

The great American author, Herman Melville, in his most celebrated book, *Moby Dick*, observed: "And the drawing near of Death, which alike levels all, alike impresses all with a last revelation, which only an author from the dead could adequately tell." These "authors from the dead", whom Melville could only imagine in the nineteenth century, are the thousands of persons who in our own time have returned to speak of the revelatory nature of their NDEs. Their tales inspire us, amaze us, and puzzle us, but they can no longer be dismissed. Our task is now to understand them, how they may happen, and what they mean. Toward this end, the volume that Evelyn Elsaesser-Valarino has given us is a giant step in our infinite journey in guest of discovering the ultimate secrets of death — and life.
